oracle@machine:~$ ps -ef |grep oracle|grep LOCAL |awk '{ if ($4>50) print $2}'
9486516
```

- Une session SQL Plus permet d'obtenir plus d'infos :

oracle@machine:~$ export ORACLE_SID=XXXXXXXXX
oracle@machine:~$ sqlplus ...
```

```

- On va faire un tour sur la machine distante (ici un Windows) :

```
netstat -an
```

- Et on détermine le process incriminé :
